

REFLECTION from the Rev. Tom O'Brien JANUARY-MARCH 2023



The past few weeks in KOTG, we have focussed on Advent. Advent is a wonderful time of year because we are asked to pause, reflect and repent in advance of our Saviour's birthday at Christmas.

This is especially important this year when we are being swept away with work commitments, growing anxiety about inflation, grappling with COVID, the war in Ukraine and planet sustainability. The danger here of course is that we may understandably miss the great opportunity Advent offers us to prepare ourselves for the coming of our Saviour.

In a recent conversation with our Archbishop, he reminded me that without repentance there can be no healing for the two are connected. Without looking deep within ourselves and acknowledging our brokenness there can be no rehabilitation. The love of God, revealed to us in Jesus Christ, reconciles us to the cross, bringing healing and restoration.

This Christmas one radio news broadcast informs us that spending is up and returning to pre-COVID norms. In alarming contrast, another channel tells us that rising costs of inflation and energy are causing panic and worry for many in the population. Keeping our focus in Advent (which means coming or arrival) on preparation for Christ, allows us to re-engage with the mystery of the Gospel and become people of hope in a time of despair. This was a key theme in one message brought to us by our visit to KOTG by Jenny and Billy Smyth from CMS Ireland. We are all connected and we must keep the Good News of Christ central to all that we do. Christmas is a wonderful time to promote healing, restoration and hope and get us into the right mindset for the New Year.

Being a Christian

A personal relationship with Jesus Christ, the Son of God, is at the heart of the Christian faith.

Men and women are created in the image of God yet separated from Him by our rebellion against Him. In His unconditional love for us, God entered our world in the person of Jesus Christ – fully human and fully divine – to give a new life through the cross which reconciles us to God. Thereafter we begin a new life with Jesus as Lord which continues into eternity as He has conquered death through His resurrection

The Apostles' Creed affirms our belief in God as Trinity – Father, Son and Holy Spirit – and that Christ was born to the Virgin Mary, died and rose again from the dead, ascended into heaven, and will come again.

We have the privilege and opportunity to approach God in prayer and to receive His teaching through the Bible. The Ten Commandments teach our duty towards God and towards our neighbour, as affirmed by Jesus: "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind.' This is the first and greatest commandment. And the second is like it: 'Love your neighbour as yourself.'" In the Lord's Prayer, we express our worship for God and our desire to see His kingdom come on Earth as it is in Heaven.

The Church of Ireland has two sacraments – Baptism and Holy Communion (also known as the Lord's Supper or Eucharist) – which are outward and visible signs of an inward and spiritual grace given to us by God, and also a means to receive that grace.

Baptism is administered by water in the name of the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit. Infants are baptised on the understanding that they will be brought up in the fellowship of the Church, taught the Christian faith, and then confirmed by the Bishop and admitted to Holy Communion when they have publicly confessed the faith. Adults are also baptised, if they have not been baptised as infants, as they too place their faith in the promises of God.

In Holy Communion, Christians continually remember the sacrifice of Jesus on the cross through the taking and receiving of bread and wine. A variety of interpretations of the meaning and significance of the bread and wine exist within the Church of Ireland, although our doctrine would not include transubstantiation. Holy Communion strengthens and refreshes the souls of those who receive it by faith.

Some Important Christian Events: January to March 2023

January

6th January: The Epiphany

Collect: O God, who by the leading of a star manifested your only Son to the peoples of the earth: Mercifully grant that we, who know you now by faith, may at last behold your glory face to face; through Jesus Christ our Lord.



18th –25th January: Week of Prayer for Christian Unity

Collect: Lord Jesus Christ, who said to your apostles, Peace I leave with you, my peace I give to you: look not on our sins but on the faith of your Church, and grant it the peace and unity of your kingdom; where you are alive and reign with the Father and the Holy Spirit; one God, now and for ever.



February

1st February: Saint Brigid's Day:

Collect: Father, by the leadership of your blessed servant Brigid you strengthened the Church in this land: As we give you thanks for her life of devoted service, inspire us with new life and light; and give us perseverance to serve you all our days; through Jesus Christ our Lord.



Lent: Ash Wednesday 22nd February:

Collect: Almighty and everlasting God, you hate nothing that you have made and forgive the sins of all those who are penitent: Create and make in us new and contrite hearts that we, worthily lamenting our sins and acknowledging our wretchedness, may receive from you, the God of all mercy, perfect remission and forgiveness; through Jesus Christ our Lord.

March

17th March: Saint Patrick's Day:

Collect: Almighty God, in your providence you chose your servant Patrick to be the apostle of the Irish people, to bring those who were wandering in darkness and error to the true light and knowledge of your Word; Grant that walking in that light we may come at last to the light of everlasting life; through Jesus Christ our Lord.

New Rector Appointed to Naas Union of Parishes

Archdeacon **Craig McCauley** has been appointed to be the new Rector for the Naas Union of parishes, Diocese of Meath and Kildare.

Currently Rector of the Virginia group of parishes in Kilmore Diocese, he is married to Vida and they have two children, Laura who is 22 and is a final year business studies student at Dublin City University and Matthew who is 18 and in 6th year at the Royal School Cavan.

Craig was born in Dublin but grew up in Castleblayney, Co. Monaghan. Vida is originally from near Boyle in Co. Roscommon. Describing his faith journey he says, "I became a committed Christian when I was 18 and at that time, I also sensed a call to ordained ministry. I was ordained in 1999 and have served in Banbridge, Co. Down, Kill O'The Grange in Dublin and for the last 18 years as Rector of the Virginia Group of Parishes in Co. Cavan."

Craig says, "As I person I would describe myself as down to earth, what you see is what you get. Family is very important to me. I am a keen follower of Leinster Rugby and Liverpool FC and since September 2019 I've taken up running *via* the local parkrun and at the end of October 2022, I completed my first marathon in Dublin." He continued, "My passion is building through word, deed and action a welcoming, caring Christian community centred on the person of Jesus Christ within the parish and out in the community."

Talking of the move he commented, "I am sad of course to be leaving the Virginia Group of Parishes and Kilmore, Elphin and Ardagh Diocese but I am excitedly looking forward to coming to Naas and to the Diocese of Meath and Kildare in early February 2023 and seeing what God has in store as we begin this new chapter of ministry. Until then I ask you to pray for me and my family as I will be praying for you."

The Church Pews

Dear Parishioner,

We are writing on behalf of the Select Vestry, to explain about the church pews.

We were all fond of the wooden church pews, they had many virtues. There was a place to store a Bible, hold your keys, hang a kneeler and you could grab the one in front to pull yourself up. They seemed like a comfortingly permanent part of the church we could all rely on.

During the Pandemic the pews were removed from the church building to facilitate social distancing. Chairs were placed in bubble groups. This revealed the church to be a very flexible space. We have laid the church out with one aisle or two aisles, we had a giant circle for the Stedfast Brass Band. The church is now being used by youth groups who avail of the AV facilities. There can be children's games, band practice and the church can be an exhibition space.

The Church is not the building or the furniture and decorations, it is us. We have changed together many times, including moving from the old parish centre across the road, the renovation of the church in the noughties and building the glass foyer at the back of the church. Together, we have shown we are able to change the ways we live, our language and the way we worship.

Sunday service without pews is a change that your Vestry hope everyone will come alongside with.

With our neighbours the Gaelscoil being facilitated in the meeting room, half of the pews are now in the storeroom. After much deliberation, the Vestry has collectively made the decision to replace the pews that have served us so well.

Our next steps will be to gather information on suitable seating options and make a decision on these with everyone's needs in mind. We intend to prioritise sourcing a limited number of orthopaedic seats.

We recognise this will be a change to our church experience, and we ask everyone to pray that we can come to terms with it; and in doing so provide a versatile space for all seven days of the week. We are a community who wish to serve the needs of as many people as possible. We want to provide a comfortable and usable space for church and community activities.

The Latrine project which we were supporting ended. has now Left is a picture of a new Latrine which we supported and helped to build. I would like to take this opportunity to thank you all for your contributions: it has been a long time coming. Norman Thompson started this project

when he was Youth Worker in the

Parish and that is some time ago (2011-2014), but it is great to see the results finally.

It was great to have Billy and Jenny Smyth with us on Sunday 27th November to launch the Coffee Project and give us updates on the Diocese and Vocational Training College. Linda Abwa was due to come but unfortunately was sick. Billy and Jenny are no strangers to Kill, having gone out as mission partners from Kill about 20 years ago. It was great to be able to welcome them back and for them to catch up with some people.

Bishop Levi has written with the following information *re* the coffee project:

He says they have been given a piece of; and about 10 feddans (a feddan = 60 metres x 70 metres) for starters. The community is going to give more land for the project. Next year the project will be expanded to the archdeaconries and parishes.

Work Plan for 2023:

- Preparation of land for transplantation
- Transplantation of seedlings to the farm
- Training of coffee extension workers from parishes on nursery management
- Raising more seedlings

Our Kids ministry were happy to be able to hold a Nativity Play for the church. The kids did a great job at practising and putting on such an amazing production.



DIOCESAN SYNODSUnited Dioceses of Dublin and Glendalough

Third Session of the 51st Diocesan Synods

IMPRESSIONS OF THE DIOCESAN SYNODS HELD ON 4TH OCTOBER 2022

The meeting of the Dublin and Glendalough Diocesan Synods began with a celebration of Holy Communion, led by the Archbishop in Taney Parish Church. All seemed well. We were reminded that the word 'synod' is taken from two Greek words σuv ('syn' = together) and $\dot{o}\delta\dot{o}\varsigma$ ('hodos' = road). Synods, in other words, are about walking and exploring together. In the process, however, many administrative details have to be addressed

It was, as always, heartening to hear so many reports from voluntary and charitable bodies within the two dioceses, working with refugees, the homeless and the marginalized. Among the appeals were for reconsideration on the accepted venues for church weddings, accommodation for students, help with refugees and the place of gay and lesbian men and women in the Church.

The main topic of the evening, however, was a Bill introduced to reform the makeup of the two Diocesan Councils of Dublin and Glendalough. It was thought that, as a recognized charitable body, the Church needed to be brought more in line with other charitable bodies in the makeup of its governing officers. The proposed measures would reflect on numbers and co-opted expertise. The proposal naturally provoked much discussion. At times it got heated.

The Bill had fourteen clauses. Each had to be voted on separately by clergy and laity. It made for a long night, which finally ended with the Grace and a sigh of relief from more than one delegate. We were, however, walking the same road.

FROM GILL AND CARLOS OLAAKA IN UGANDA

December 2022



Dear KOTG family,

Hello to everyone in the KOTG family, and we trust you are well and in good form. As I write this in December, I know the winter must be closing in fast with dark evenings and coldness; we do hope and pray that things are going despite challenges with heating and the economy in general. We are still facing a very high cost of living here, with fuel prices pushing expenses high, and this has been one factor that meant all schools closed two weeks earlier than normal, as schools have not been able to manage their expenses against their income. The other major reason is related to an ebola outbreak that has been ongoing for a couple of months; thankfully, it is being contained quite well, but some districts are on localised lockdowns to try to limit the spread. This is a ferocious disease, with a 50% mortality rate, though thankfully, it is not spread as easily as other viruses such as COVID-19, as people are only contagious when symptomatic. We do pray that the peak has come and that we will enter the new year without this shadowing over us; Uganda schools have just closed for their end of year, the school terms being three starting February and ending in December, and so we are praying for a normal opening in February 2023.

Elsewhere in Abaana, the last three months have been full of exciting activities, for which we thank God. These include the following:

 In partnership with some local mission agencies, we were blessed to have some special Christian outreaches run in schools in their last term, and this was a wonderful time for the gospel to be shared. We pray each child with whom we have contact would know what it means to follow Christ and make that choice for themselves.

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- We ran a 6-week project called 'Zuri' (meaning beautiful in Swahili), teaching pre-teens and young teenagers in primary school (as often children are above the rightful age here) about menstrual hygiene and sexual health. Girls learned how to make washable, reusable pads and boys and girls both participated in the life skills sessions. We ran the project in three schools as a pilot and hope to extend this to other schools next year. It was very encouraging that the post-project analysis showed an increase in knowledge of, on average, 18% across schools.
- Scott Baxter, the Abaana founder, visited Abaana for two years after a hiatus of 2 ½ years due to COVID-19. It was good to have him 'on the ground' again, and he especially enjoyed meeting beneficiary children, including the choir children and New Life Homes boys. Special meals or meetings were held for different groups of children, and it was especially encouraging to meet with a group of alumni who have completed their studies and are generally doing well in the working world.
- We ran child safeguarding training sessions in all schools to establish safeguarding committees to try to deal with child protection issues in the community. It is very unfortunate that culturally, it is very normal for girls as young as 14 to be 'married off', yet this is clearly against the law and never in the child's best interests. As school leaders face these kinds of situations regularly in village areas, doing this training will hopefully deter families who take it as a norm once they understand it is actually a criminal case.
- We were blessed to be able to give out different items in our 16 partner schools, such as textbooks, footballs, learning charts, Bibles, curricula and new classroom furniture. As schools have struggled to manage their budgets this academic year, these donations were a real boost to encourage them in their work providing education in low-income communities.
- We are currently giving out a small Christmas package, including a food parcel and a gift to children, and it is a joy to see their delight. We were also able to give out some other items to individual children and families, such as animals like goats and pigs and mosquito nets. One of our staff Hannah had this to say about this vital project:

Many times we go to schools to do our routine visits, but we find some children missing, and we are told that they are suffering from malaria. Malaria has been a very serious problem for the children, but we thank God that among the grants was the distribution of mosquito nets. The children at New Foundations School were very happy about these, and one of them called Harriet said," I am very happy Abaana has given me a new mosquito net because mosquitos have been disturbing me in the night and I would doze in class because I did not get enough sleep and I would often fall sick of malaria, but now I am going to be safe. My siblings, too, will be safe because we will share it. Thank you, Abaana, for always caring about my health. God bless you."

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Through a company called 'Give Clarity' which made a special donation, Gertrude is one of the 91 beneficiaries who received a she-goat. She was so excited upon receiving her goat: "I am so pleased with this gift of a goat I have received today. I never in life thought of anything like this; it is a surprise. We are going to ensure we provide good care for this goat so that it will multiply and help us meet our future needs."

We are delighted that Josiah and Judah completed their first term back at school very well, and we are so grateful that everything went extremely well. They have both made lovely friends, with one family living within walking distance from our house, which is amazing (especially considering the school is 15 km away!) They have been enjoying the extracurricular activities of sports and things like art, which were difficult during home school. Although the days are a bit long with the commute, overall, we are very pleased with how the Lord led us to send them back and grateful that the new school leaders are doing a great job.

Thank you as ever for the support and care; this will be read, I know, in the New Year, after the Christmas season has passed, so we do hope and pray it was a joyous and restful time for you and your loved ones, and that as 2023 begins, we can all look to Christ for His peace and presence in the year ahead.


